THE QUOTABLE DOMINICAN

St. Thomas Aquinas

1225 - 1274

Doctor of the Church and patron of Catholic universities, colleges, schools, and students.

Feast Day: January 28

St. Thomas wrote about the important role the Saints play in daily life.

He especially emphasized the power of St. Joseph, stating:

“Our holy patron St. Joseph has the power to assist us in all cases, in every necessity, in every undertaking.”

DID YOU KNOW?

From January 6, 2021, through January 6, 2022, the Dominican Family will be celebrating the 800th anniversary of the death of St. Dominic. When he died, he was buried in a wooden tomb. A decade later, his brethren sought his canonization—the process where he would be declared a Saint. This required that they exhume his body to collect the relics.

The Dominicans were concerned that his body might have rotted, as water had entered the wooden tomb. Because of this fear, they allowed only the friars to be present for the gathering of his relics. Rather than the expected stench, the friars found the remains to have a “pleasant, sweet smell.”

For all Catholics, the body plays an important role both in life and death. The question of incorruptibility was extremely important to medieval Catholics and for any process of canonization. The sweet, unexpected odor emanating from St. Dominic’s relics was a reminder to all those present of his holy life.

Dear Friends,

He is one of the most important saints in the history of salvation, yet he does so with a silent and trusting fidelity.

Whatever comes next in these uncertain times—hope or fear, joy or challenge—the Dominicans are committed to the TRUTH and to YOU. We pray for your soul to enter heaven!

Brothers and Sisters—we need only one thing: to become Saints, pure and simple! **Even when it seems we are “strangers in a strange land,” may our focus remain on the HOPE of Christ’s Resurrection at Easter, until we reach our heavenly homeland!**

Friars Pray for End to Abortion

During COVID-19, we pray for the end to a different type of pandemic: abortion

Amidst the pandemic, we know that death can be near and life is a gift. We also remember and grieve the loss of thousands of lives that never saw the light of day: America's aborted babies. We Dominicans remain committed to fighting this evil. The dignity of every life is sacred, from conception to natural death.

On January 22nd, the Day of Prayer for the Unborn, the friars of St. Albert's Priory in Oakland held an all-night vigil. They prayed fervently for these lost lives and an end to abortion. Friars at St. Dominic's Church in San Francisco held a vigil Mass for Life. Fr. Michael asked us to pray for those scarred by abortion, highlighting Black communities disproportionately affected by abortion.

Because of your support, we can remain committed to LIFE during this pandemic. May we pray for life and hope... for those at risk from the virus, for those who feel abortion is their only choice, and for the lives lost to abortion. May we love with open hearts, giving thanks for the gift of life.

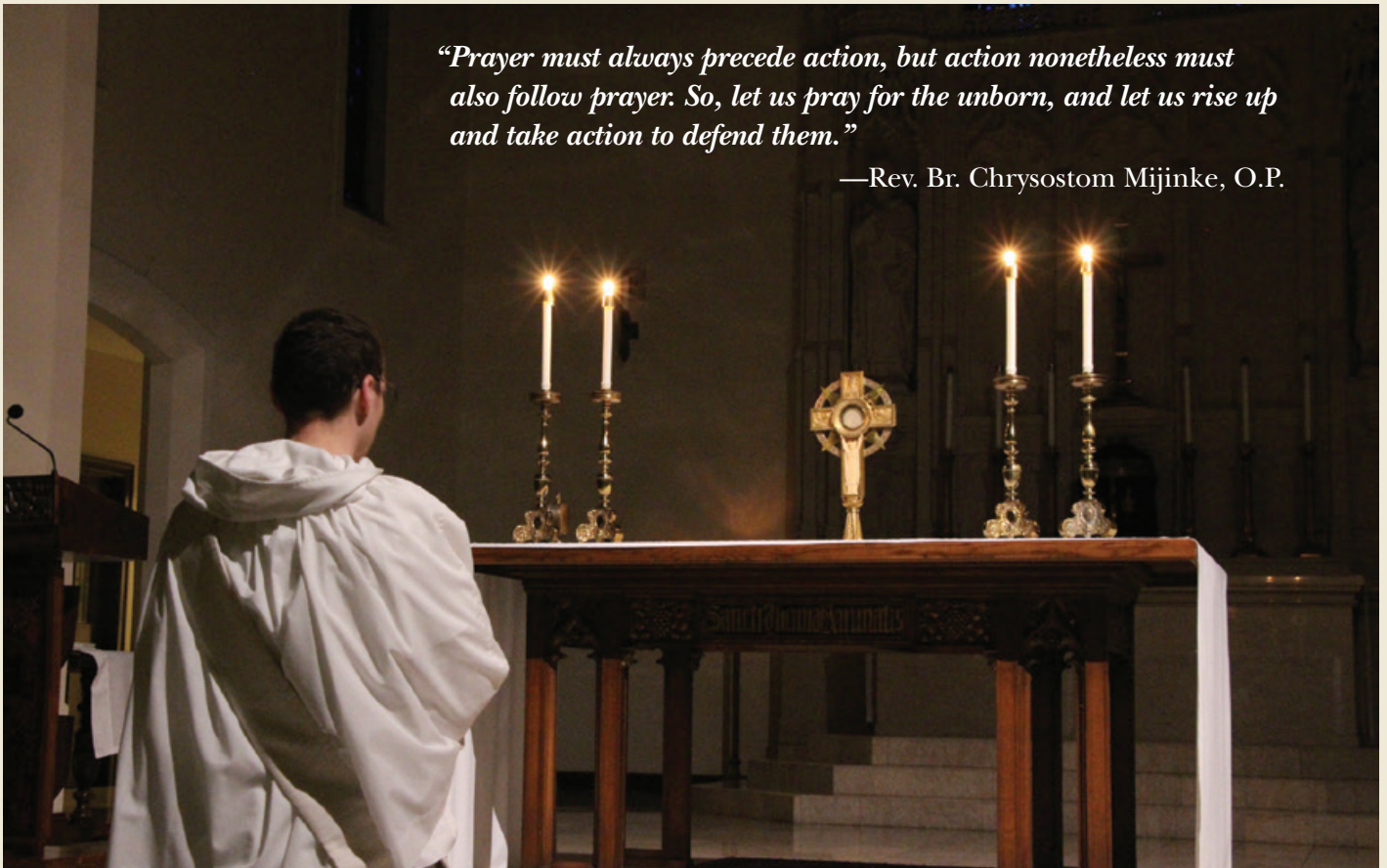


Fr. Michael Hurley, O.P., preaches for a renewal of hearts during the Vigil for Life at St. Dominic's Church in San Francisco.

St Joseph: His YES at the Annunciation

In the “dual annunciation,” we are called deeper into our own vocations

At the Annunciation, Mary says “yes” to becoming the Mother of God. Similarly, when the angel appears to St. Joseph in a dream, he says “yes” to becoming the earthly father of Jesus. At the same time, he reaffirms his commitment as Mary’s betrothed husband.

In the “dual annunciation” to Mary and Joseph we perceive a profound witness to marriage. For in the Jewish culture, those who were betrothed made a much firmer commitment than our contemporary notion of “engagement.” When St. Joseph is betrothed to Mary, he gives his full consent to a life with her. He makes a life-long covenant to love her and welcome any

children. When the angel appears to Joseph in a dream, he reaffirms his commitment to Mary, a commitment that now has a new, unimaginable dimension. For he also receives his vocation as father to the Christ child (see Mt. 1:20). St. John Paul II writes in *Redemptoris Custos*: “In the words of the “annunciation” by night, Joseph not only heard the divine truth concerning his wife’s indescribable vocation; he also heard once again the truth about his own vocation.”

We ask St. Joseph to pray for us, as we learn the truth of our own vocations. We turn to St Joseph when we are called in our own lives to a greater gift of self. We ask him for his prayers when we are called to greater generosity towards our families and greater trust in the Lord during difficult times. He is our example, he who had such trust to let the Lord mold his love until it was capable of receiving Our Lady and the Christ child.

St. Joseph knew deeply the love of God in his vocation as husband and father. St. John Paul II writes: “This love of God also molds—in a completely unique way—the love of husband and wife, deepening within it everything of human worth and beauty, everything that bespeaks an exclusive gift of self, a covenant between persons, and an authentic communion according to the model of the Blessed Trinity.”

The Lord calls all of us to say YES to the vocations he has created for us. As Mary and Joseph entered into a life of marriage raising the Christ child, so we turn to St. Joseph as we strive to love our families. Perhaps this moment of uncertainty and pandemic is an opportunity to make a new beginning in our own families, one rooted in Christ’s love.

May we all be shaped by God’s love, allowing it to mold us to become more like our faithful protector—St. Joseph.

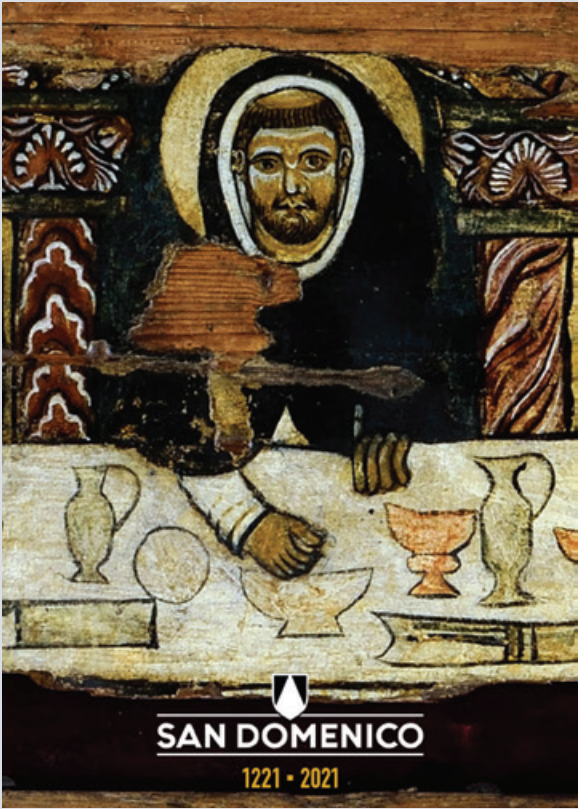

40th Jubilee | Ordained March 20, 1981

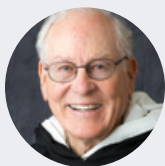

50th Jubilee | Ordained December 17, 1971

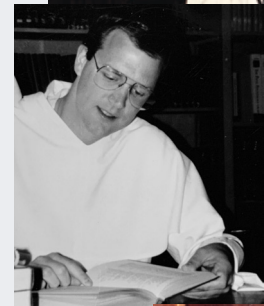
Fr. Raymond was involved in campus ministry across the Western Province. He is now retired, living at Blessed Sacrament Priory in Seattle, WA.

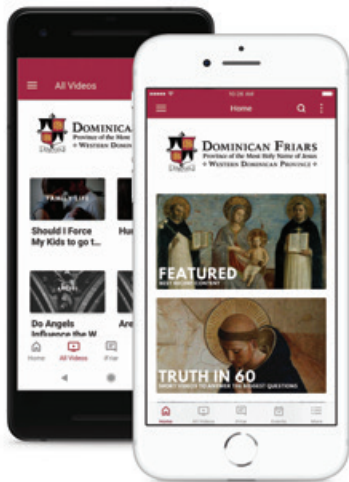
The Master of the Order asks Dominican School of Philosophy and Theology to Become International Center of Study

A Profile in Generosity: The Ikegami Family

Experiencing God's presence and love through the Dominicans

How did you first get involved/connected with the Dominicans?

I (Cindy) first connected with the Dominicans through the St. Dominic's Young Adult group in San Francisco. I got more involved several years later by attending daily Mass at St. Albert's Priory and introduced my husband Brad to the Dominicans.

What do you appreciate most about the Dominican presence in your life?

We are grateful to have so many memories with the Dominicans! But if we had to pick one... the Dominicans have been a major presence in our family throughout the years, especially during our painful struggle with infertility. They supported us with prayers and the sacraments, which helped us seek and trust God's will for our family. So it was incredibly meaningful for us that Fr. Bryan Kromholtz, O.P., baptized our three children. Fr. Bryan was also there for us after a pregnancy loss. Through his ministry, we powerfully experienced God's presence and love during that time.

Why do you choose to support the Dominicans?

Watching the young Dominican student brothers progress in their formation at St. Albert's Priory gives us great hope for the future of the Church and her ability to proclaim the Gospel. We feel fortunate to be able to participate in this work in some way. Seeing many of the former student brothers who were in formation now vibrantly living out their vocations as priests is very rewarding... definitely a very high return on investment!

What do the Dominicans offer that you believe is of the most value to society today?

The ability to explain the truths of the Gospel to our culture by meeting it where it's at: bringing faith to the common ground of reason. Knowing the Dominicans has given us confidence to share the Gospel in our own circles,

knowing that we are standing on the broad shoulders of intellectual giants of the faith.

Why do you think interest in the Dominican Order is growing?

Faithfulness to the truth of Christ and the Gospel. As the truth has become more rare and precious in our culture, it seems natural that demand would increase.

What do you wish other people knew about the Dominicans?

We have seen the Dominicans perform miracles. When we were involved with a Catholic marriage preparation ministry, we often served at retreats with Dominicans. The majority of the participants had been away from the church for years. A Dominican friar would enter the room in full habit, inspiring awe in the group, and then give a talk on confession and invite everyone to the sacrament. Every time, most, if not all, would voluntarily sign up for confession. It was so powerful to witness people responding to God's love and mercy through the Dominicans.
